VICAR'S REPORT

2010 was a year with many highlights. **The Ultimate Goal Festival** was an amazing time of sharing the Good News with those around us, and an important learning experience. Our long-standing partnership with Through Faith Missions should enable us to offer a suitable ministry to the tens of thousands of visitors during the Olympics; it is good to see more church members training as TFM Missioners. It was good to have **Darren McIndoe** back for a short time, before we sent him off to Stoke-on-Trent as Vicar of Burslem and Middleport. It was also good to attend **Modicum Okello's** induction as Vicar of Hall Green in Birmingham, and to attend the ordination as Priest of **Christy and Cornelius**. Last, but not least, we welcomed 2 new Ministers - Rev. **Peter Ngugi** as Curate and **Cheryl Ramballi** as Reader; we also sponsored **Robert Otule** for Reader Ministry training. We also saw Pat Larocque begin training for ministry as a Pastoral Assistant, and the Evangelism Team grow in confidence in their Saturday Morning work. It's good to be able to share in the wider fellowship of the Body of Christ as we receive and share ministry with the wider church.

I celebrated **20 years at St. John's** in April 2010. The general wisdom is that 20 years in the same parish is too long, but with the constant change in Stratford it has seemed like I have been Vicar of several different parishes over the past 20 years. As we look back over 20 years, we have seen real growth in numbers and ministry; even our building has become bigger. There is, however, no place for sitting back and resting - there are lots of new challenges around us, and we need to be ready to minister to them. Please keep on growing in faith, and please pray for me, that I will have the strength to continue for a while more!

I remain grateful that we have such a **good team at St. John's**; numbers have grown only slightly during the year, but we have consolidated ministry. I am particularly grateful to Robert for taking over leadership of the Gazebo Team, and to Sheva for training extra Prayer Ministers. As our ministry opportunities grow, it is important that our Ministry team grows.

Over the past 5 years I have spent a lot of time working, with other local Ministers, on the **inSpire** project, (not a misprint - that's how we spell it). This project has been working to establish a Christian space somewhere in the Stratford City development. It now seems that we have managed to secure a space in the Westfield Shopping Centre for a Prayer Room, to be used by people of all faiths. The new Vicar of St. Matthew's will spend some time as co-ordinating chaplain for this project, but I believe that St. John's, as the closest church, will need to provide some volunteers to staff the space, and possibly offer some Christian Prayer opportunities to the centre users. We expect the shopping centre to open in September, and inSpire will need to be up and running on day one.

Demand for meeting space at the church was high in 2010. As we face cuts in services, and as other voluntary organisations close, churches will be at the forefront of meeting community needs. I suspect that churches will survive the cuts better than many other groups. We are among the few organisations with an independent funding stream, (our Giving), not reliant on grants or contracts from local or central government. It is important that we are there for people, offering spiritual and practical hope and help in difficult times. Please pray that the Lord will give us a clear vision for our ministry and mission over the next few years.

Thank you for your continued partnership in Jesus' service during 2010. We have shared good and bad times together, and Jesus promises to give us his strength to continue in his service.

- The first event in January was a Thanksgiving Service for the life of Sir Emmanuel Nzewuihe, a long-standing member of St. John's.
- Every month we walk to a different part of our parish and pray for the area. In February we prayed at the Olympic site – for safety for the construction workers, for everything that happens during the Olympic & Paralympic Games, and for the legacy.
- Joyce Newby's egg cosies were a big hit before Easter and raised money for Richard House Children's Hospice.
- Hundreds of people visited St. John's on the day of the Unlock sponsored walk in East London at the end of April, and the Women's Group served refreshments.
- Several children play musical instruments and they joined the music group to play a song at the Sunday Club 20th Birthday.
- Stratford Churches' "Ultimate Goal" T-shirts went on sale in April – hundreds were sold with the message "Transforming Stratford one life at a time".
- Wednesday Lunchtime Concerts ran from the beginning of May to end of September.
- On 9th May there was a special Service of Thanksgiving, organised by Cheryl Ramballi, for the new rooms that have been created downstairs – we're very grateful for the legacies, donations and grants that made the work possible.
- The Women's Group had an eventful weekend in North Norfolk in May, visiting Rev. Pat Baggaley's parish to perform at a fund-raising concert.
- Frances Aubrey organised a Choir Awayday in May.
- "Picnic in the Park" on the Sunday afternoon of Bank Holiday weekends has become a regular event.
- 5th – 12th June was the "Ultimate Goal" Festival, as 18 Stratford Churches joined together to share the Good News of Jesus with the people of the area.
- Rev. Darren McIndoe came back for a few weeks to help with the "Ultimate Goal" event and then he went to be a Vicar in Stoke on Trent.
- Peter Ngugi was ordained in Chelmsford Cathedral at the beginning of July.
- Keziah Jimoh and Robert Otule graduated from the Course in Christian Studies.
- Gill Carter invited the whole Church to her 60th Birthday party on 18th July.
- Summer Sundays were generally fine and most Services were open-air in the churchyard – this year we needed insect-repellent as it was a bad year for wasps.
- Sheva Williams organised a Service on the green at the Carpenters Estate on 1st August, to pray for the residents of the area and for the future of the estate.
- Southend was the destination for this year's coach trip in August.
- Sadly, Karlene Henry (a friend of St. John's) died in September after a long illness. St. John's Choir sang at her funeral in Hornchurch (where Cornelius is Curate).
- Dave & Carol were away in early October on a Mission in Wales (Taith Dewi Sant).
- After many years of study, Cheryl Ramballi was licensed as a Reader in October
- Dave went on a tour of Olympic venues in mid-October – you must look at the October photo on St. John's website!
- St. John's definitely has talent – as we saw at the Saints' Party in October.
- A new venture – a free film show on a big screen in November.
- The Confirmation Service was a large occasion – and the Bishop baked a cake!
- Stratford Churches opened a Winter Nightshelter, one night a week, as a pilot project.
- Another new venture was the Stratford Churches' Carol Singing before Christmas.
- The younger children in Sunday Club performed a nativity play on 19th December.

SUNDAY SERVICES

are an important part of our Mission and Ministry. The Bible expects that Christians will meet together to praise God: "Praise God with the trumpet, the harp, the lyre, the tambourine, strings and flute" - (Psalm 150), to encourage one another: "Let us not give up meeting together,.....but let us encourage one another" - (Hebrews 10:25), and to share ministry together: "To each one a gift of the Spirit is given for the common good" - (1 Corinthians 12:7). We meet together to share faith and learn how to live for Jesus, wherever we are, during the week.

THE MORNING SERVICE continues to be our largest service. It is a one-stop shop with prayer, praise, teaching (including special teaching for children and young people), prayer ministry and fellowship over coffee. On alternate weeks there is also Holy Communion, and there are often groups meeting, for different purposes, after the service. During 2009, average attendance remained constant at 329. This service aims to be as inclusive as possible, and we emphasise this with all-age teaching at the 4th Sunday Together services, which often incorporate baptisms, and the summer series of Open Air Services..

A very large number of people help to make this service happen, and we need to recognise their hard work and commitment to ministry.

THE EVENING SERVICE averaged 63 people during 2010, a significant increase over 2009. This service is quieter than the morning, with more opportunities to incorporate different patterns of worship. Healing and Prayer ministry have been increasingly important at this service. During 2010

THE CHOIR AND MUSIC GROUP

The Choir exists to help lead worship at the morning and evening services, by our familiarity with the hymns and songs, giving the congregation a good lead as we come together to worship God. To this end we have worked hard this year to learn new music and improve the quality of our singing. A new departure for this year has been the "Choir Awaydays", of which there have been two. These have been study days, starting with a scripture meditation and going on to learn new music, which will later be used in services. These have been popular with the Choir. When the last one was ending, people were heard to say, "Do we have to go. Can't we go on singing?" We are very pleased to have a small number of young people in the choir and would welcome any others who wish to join us.

The band has maintained its core of members, with a regular morning line-up of guitars, 'cello and bass guitar, horn and drums. It has been

particularly pleasing to see a new group of younger drummers joining the rota. The evening set-up has again been quite settled with guitar, clarinet, horn and drums. We are pleased to welcome "guest" members who join us regularly but not weekly. We are always on the look-out for new musicians. Would-be members need to be fluent readers and sight readers. If you fit that description don't hide your instrument (light) under a bowl – bring it out and use it to praise the Lord with us!

PRAYER MINISTRY takes place in the prayer chapel during Sunday morning and Sunday evening services. There are 39 prayer ministers: three members completed the training course this year to enable them to take part in Outreach.

Prayer ministers pray in pairs for people who come forward with prayer requests; many people are very grateful for the service we provide and have returned to give thanks for prayers answered.

We are thankful to God that we are in a team growing both spiritually and in numbers; although some members have moved on, numbers remain unchanged.

During 2011 we plan to have two meetings for discussion and to refresh: our aim is for God to continue to bless us and strengthen us and to make us a blessing to others for his glory.

THE ARK

At the end of 2010 there were 40 children aged 1-3½ on the Ark Register, which compares with 41 in 2009 and 41 in 2008 – which shows a remarkable consistency. Obviously it's not the same children, as a number moved up to Sparklers during the year. The changes implemented early in 2010 to take account of increased weekly numbers have continued to work well, and the children have benefited from the routine and consistency across the weeks, (very important since different people lead the group). During the year 15 adults were part of the team taking it in turns to lead the group (thank you). Each session includes a story from the Bible and a special activity.

SUNDAY CLUB

There are 4 Sunday Club groups covering the ages from 3½ -13. At the end of 2010 the number of children registered was:

- Sparklers (age 3½ – 5) 39 (27 in 2009)
- Kingdom Kids (age 6 – 7) 24 (18 in 2009)
- The 'J' Team (age 8 – 10) 25 (32 in 2009)
- Teen LIVE! (age 11 – 13) 32 (22 in 2009)

During the year 30 adults have been leaders or assistants for the various Sunday Club groups – thank you everyone.

We use the Scripture Union “Light” syllabus. During the year the children covered the following topics:

January – Paul’s journeys in Acts
February – Moses in the desert (including the Ten Commandments)
March – “Light for Life” (Good Friday & Easter)
April – Joshua
May – Jesus - true path and true guide
June – Jesus the healer
July – Judges rule God’s people
September – Sharing the Good News
October – The challenge of following Jesus
November – Hearing from God (Samuel)
December – God is Love (Christmas)

On Easter Sunday the children were given fair-trade Easter Eggs and “He is Risen” balloons. At the end of April Sunday Club celebrated its 20th Birthday.

Some of the older children attended the Scripture union Longbarn Camp in Kent in August. Once again, Sheva Williams organised a successful Saints’ Party at the end of October with the theme “Stratford’s Got Talent”. In November 4 members of Sunday Club (+ 3 members of YPF) were confirmed. All the children who attended over the Christmas season were given a Christmas present.

YPF is a youth fellowship group for 14-19 year olds, and meets during the Sunday morning service for a 30-45 minute session. Typical sessions will involve bible study, prayer and worship but in a creative or multimedia way. The main news for the group over the last 12 months is that we have said goodbye to many of our older members, who have gone to university, the workplace or the main body of the church

congregation. A crop of new members is currently coming up through the ranks, and they have taken to the style and format of our meetings well.

A few members of YPF went to the Barnstaple 1 Venture in the summer, which was a great week of teaching and activities. We hope to take more in 2011.

Other aims are that we would hold more social events, arrange fundraising for the Asha Trust, and grow more and more in love with Jesus Christ. It’s also very exciting that Chizoma has gained her youth work certificate and will take a greater role in leading the group.

CHURCHWARDENS AND WELCOMERS

The Bible is quite clear on the value of “Gifts” to spreading and servicing God’s Word: and it is important to remember that “they also serve who only stand and wait”. At the last count around a fifth of the congregation have volunteered to form part of the Welcoming Team. Wonderful. Let’s be honest: the first face a stranger to St John’s will see will be that of a member of this Team; and for a regular attender the face of a known friend is also a sign of community spirit and love. The responsibility here is a great one, and I for one am very grateful for all who undertake it, a gratitude I know is shared by the Clergy and other members of the leadership. **[Advert: there is always room for more volunteers].**

St John’s has four Wardens: we have that many because we have a large congregation of worshippers. Wardens are like civilian workers inside the Army: Dave and Carol and both Peters and Sheva and Rosemond and Cheryl are the religious Officers [thank you all], but they rely on many of the rest of us to perform some of the every-day jobs to leave them freer for the more direct Mission. Some of us get to wear badges and go to fun-packed PCC meetings, and even Deanery Synod. Yet remember, we are all part of the St John’s Team – Office staff, Vergers, Choir, PCC Members, Wardens, Welcomers, Grimebusters, the Car Park attendants and, of course, all of us in the congregation. We travel different paths, but the destination is the same.

If I have any targets for the future then it would be to build upon the generosity of volunteers amongst the congregation: one of the things that really pleases me when on duty “at the back” is the willingness and eagerness of St John’s members to step in and help out if, (for instance), a Welcomer is missing. With more people

attending, especially during the 2012 Olympic period, we could do with more Welcomers. We could and should make more of the foreign language skills of the congregation. We must be proud of St John's as a beautiful building, as a place of worship, as a symbol for a revived Stratford and, most importantly, as the House of God.

THE TEA MAKERS

This Ministry operates on a voluntary basis and is as important as other St John's ministries. We serve refreshments in the café area after Sunday services, morning and evening. Everyone

is welcome to sit around for a chat to meet new members and make new friends.

This ministry helps to build relationships. It is seen in the light of God using his people as they grow in faith by serving others. Some 25 volunteers work on a rota basis, each member working around once per month in a group of 5 to 6 people. Sometimes we serve home-made cakes, celebrating a birthday, for example. We often keep in touch during the week as members sometimes ask for support through prayers. As this ministry is growing, we pray that God blesses all his enthusiastic people in what He has called them to do, and we hope for this blessing to continue in the coming years.

MIDWEEK SERVICES AND MEETINGS

Jesus said that the Temple at Jerusalem should be: "A house of prayer for all nations" - (Mark 11:17). St. John's ministry and mission continues throughout the week. There are daily prayers at 9am and 5pm Monday-Friday, mid-week services, homegroups, and our Healing Café. The church is also open for prayer almost every day

THE TUESDAY LUNCHTIME SERVICE

is the shortest service of the week at St John's, lasting for just twenty minutes, from 1.10 to 1.30, but in that time, we manage to include a hymn, a Bible reading and talk, and some prayers. Dave, Sheva and Iris share in leading it and we follow each series for several weeks.

The services attract a variety of people and, for those on their lunch break, we try to make sure that we don't overrun! Numbers can be anything from twelve to twenty plus, with over 140 people attending the Christmas carol service. I know from experience how much it helps to have a space during the day when you can switch off from other things and focus on God. But you don't have to work in Stratford to come to the service! We all need time out and fellowship during our busy weeks. If you are around on Tuesday lunchtimes, why not come and join us?

THE AGENDA GROUP is a new group, formed in autumn 2010. It was recognised that there was no specific ministry for the 'single' people who form part of the congregation at St. John's Church. For 2011 the group aims to attract a good mix of men and women of different ages and cultures, to encourage real and natural friendships amongst members, to facilitate a number of interesting, informative and thought provoking forums throughout the year and to encourage organisation and participation in a variety of social activities

ST. JOHN'S WOMEN'S GROUP meets on the first Friday of every month at 7.30pm. Around 15 people attend, with 5 postal members

The group exists for fellowship with each other combining bible study, discussion on preparation, coordination and support of Church functions, as well as women's issues.

The group sent another relief package in October to Burma's Good Life Club for displaced persons, and continued fellowship with the team of churches in Mundesley, Norfolk fundraising (May

2010). They also organised a Women's Pamper Evening as part of the Ultimate Goal Festival in June 2010 and organised refreshments for the Unlock Walk in April 2010.

During 2011, the group aims to continue to support to St Johns Church functions (including hospice visits) and Women's issues. The group strives to provide more support for international groups, as well as those at home.

MISSION, OUTREACH and SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Jesus said: "Go and make disciples of all nations". - (Matthew 28:19). St. John's Church aims to be, "Local, Outward-Looking and Participating", (Faith in the City Report). We want to relate to the local community and reflect the love of Jesus for those around us.

EVANGELISM AT ST. JOHN'S is overseen directly by PCC. This ensures that Evangelism is at the heart of all PCC decisions.

The highlight of 2010 was the "**Ultimate Goal**" festival in June - a major event, in partnership with Through Faith Missions, involving 18 Stratford Churches.

The Ultimate Goal was a multi-faceted festival. Each church contributed some special events, leading to a good programme stretched over 8 days. Part of the aim was to explore opportunities for "Mission Olympic" in 2012, so St John's majored on events in the churchyard with live entertainment, free refreshments, and, most popular of all, Prayer! The amazing response to this work in the churchyard surprised everyone, leading the TFM team to describe the Churchyard as "Holy Ground" - a common description for Churchyards, but with a whole new meaning for TFM evangelists. St John's also contributed a Women's Pamper evening, Men's Curry Evening, Gospel Concert, Community Fête, two Open Air Morning Services and hosted two Stratford Churches Evening Services with a healing theme.

Other events during the week included music nights, a large screen football night, a men's breakfast, youth events, pub outreach and the very popular Hot Potato Lunch, where a baked potato was eaten and a "hot potato" subject discussed.

Most people thought that the week was very worthwhile as a mission, (some of the smaller churches gained a significant number of people as a result of the week), but the greatest value was the fact that it demonstrated that 18 diverse churches could train together, work together and share in mission to the community together. Further events are planned, leading up to 2012.

We continue to work at making the most of the Mission opportunities, provided by our location, Sunday Services and open doors. We have continued with a number of regular Mission events and initiatives during the year:

- **Prayer Walks** have continued, led by Gill and Iris. These provide an opportunity to pray for a small area and invite prayer requests from residents.
- **The Healing Café** continued every Tuesday with Sheva in charge.

- The outdoor **Christmas Nativity Scene and Easter Garden**, were, again, powerful reminders of the Christian message. Thanks to Chris Aubrey for all his work on these.
- Gill Carter organised the **Flower Cross** at the front of the church for Holy Week and Easter.
- We sent out 3000 **Easter cards**, incorporating a message and an advert for our Easter services.
- We managed 5 out of 6 **Open-air morning Services** in the churchyard during July and August, with very good feedback from passers by.
- We took full advantage of the **Christmas** mission opportunities with carol singing in the Shopping centre, our annual Lunchtime carol Service and a host of other special services. The 20s & 30s Group sang Carols at the Three Mills estate. We continued to deliver Christmas cards to all accessible homes and workplaces.

During the summer months The Gazebo Team were again at work in the churchyard.

The 'GAZEBO' Outreach team is an evangelistic mission of the church that meets on Saturdays, (designated dates) to bring 'church' and prayer efforts to members of the general public who might walk through the churchyard and the Broadway. We sometimes use questionnaires, which may be general or specific, according to the church calendar. The name of the outreach is taken from the Gazebo tent that is used for shelter in the churchyard.

To date we have a total of up to six 'full time' members/volunteers although it is expected that more will be added in the course of 2011 as the result of the TFM (Through Faith Missions) course in February 2011

The group offers prayer to passers-by in a spirit of love-witness for Christ as well as tea and coffee for those who might be hungry and/or thirsty.

Current full-time team members are Patricia Larocque, Iris Bryzak, Eon Wade, Marcia Hazel, Keziah Jimoh. Bunmi Opedare and Flora Manieson have also joined us, and Sheva has trained us for Prayer Ministry.

SUMMER MUSIC AT ST JOHN'S.

May – September 2010

Once again, there was a full programme of 22 lunch-time concerts beginning on 5th May and continuing until 29th September.

This year we heard from 6 organists, 3 pianists, 4 jazz ensembles, 2 wind groups, 4 singers and 1 each from a school choir, a gospel singer and a folk duo. The performers were as widely spread as ever, coming from the far north of Scotland and Tennessee, USA as well as a good contingent from East Anglia. 14 of the 22 were from Newham.

There was a significant increase in audience numbers this year, with most of the concerts seeing more than 20 which, we are told, is a very healthy number for a lunch-time concert outside the centre of London.

Many of the concerts were excellent, but worthy of special note were the 4 in which local jazz musician Marius Rudnick played a part, the amazing "Lone Arranger", a wonderful programme of Jazz and Show numbers on the oboe, and almost at the end of the season, a terrific Organ recital, shared by two musicians which included a special take on The Last Night of the Proms, complete with whistles, bells and a huge Union flag!

We already have a number of new contacts for the 2011 season and thinking ahead to 2012, we are hoping to be able to run extra concerts – one each day during the Olympics – watch this space!

MISSION/CHARITY GIVING

The MGC (Mission Giving Committee) meets to agree recommendations to the PCC for St John's Mission Giving Fund. The fund is made up of 10% of budgeted giving from the congregation. 80% of this is given to organisations as a regular donation, while the remaining 20% is given to emergency appeals, usually through charities. (In addition to this, it is worth noting that St John's gives away the Christmas Collections from its Lunchtime Carol Service, and the Midnight Christmas Communion – this year it was given to the Newham Nightshelter).

Rafe Smallman convenes MGC. Jean Scott (host!), Garry Walker, Dorothy Hylton and Dave Richards remained as members of MGC, and Joel Lewis left the committee in July 2010.

We gave regular donations to 15 organisations in 2010 and supported 3 appeals with the Emergency money. Details of this can be found below and on the St. Johns website.

SCHOOLS WORK continued during 2010, with a large number of school groups visiting St. John's. COMMUNITY MEETING FACILITIES

St. John's aims to be open all week to serve the community. The requests for use of the Church facilities are increasing year on year.

Our priorities are to meet the perceived needs of the local community. We particularly seek to provide space and encouragement for:

- Community arts
- Children and young people
- Community meetings and events
- Education and training
- A subsidiary aim is to allow the church to be open for a large part of every day as a place of peace and quiet in a busy part of London, and as a venue for displays and exhibitions.

During 2010 a large number of organisations used our facilities.
